The Plan has been implemented by HP State Fisheries Deptt. for which total amount of Rs 130.00 Lakhs was deposited by the Project during January-March 2006.</p> <p>As per the progress report received from Fisheries Deptt. in December 2012, the entire amount of Rs 130.00 Lakhs has been fully utilized for part funding of Trout Fish seed farm located at Hamni in Distt. Kullu. The fish farm is operational and capacity of fish farm is 8 ton per year. Further, in order to propagate fisheries in Sainj River, State Fisheries Deptt. has released about 12000 seeds of brown trout in the upstream of the reservoir of Parbati-III HEP on 10.4.2019 and 15600 seeds on 08.04.2021. The plan stands completed.</p>

An e-flow measuring device has also been installed for online monitoring of e-flow as per direction of HP State Pollution control Board.
