i.	<p>9 families of the 2 villages of Geil Khola & 29th Mile, comprising total 51 persons will be affected. Out of total, 31 persons are fully affected and 19 persons partially affected. The affected families should be rehabilitated as per R & R plan proposed & submitted this ministry.</p>	<p>As per EIA&EMP Report, total 36 nos. of Project Affected Families (PAFs) got affected due to formation of reservoir. Out of which 27 families were losing land and 9 families losing their homestead land & house and all the 36 nos. of PAFs were compensated.</p> <p>Further, in view of impoundment of the reservoir and operation of Project, a compensation Committee was constituted by the Gorkha Territorial Administration (GTA) vide memo dated 20.02.2014 for families residing along the rim of reservoir. The Committee identified total 84 nos. PAFs located across three villages viz. 29th Mile, Geil Khola and Teesta Bazar along rim of reservoir on right bank of river Teesta.</p> <p>Details of Compensation are as below:</p> <p>a. In the 1st phase, an amount of Rs. 106.65 lakhs was sanctioned for 13 nos. of PAFs at 29th Mile. Out of which a total of Rs. 93.44 lakh disbursed to 11 PAFs as per consent of District Administration and GTA, whereas 02 PAFs refused to accept the compensation determined by the committee.</p> <p>b. In the 2nd Phase, amount Rs. 837.75 lakhs was sanctioned for balance 71 PAFs. Out of which a total of Rs. 813.08 lakh disbursed to 71 PAFs (68 PAF's received full amount while 03 PAFs received 50% amount) as per consent of District Administration and GTA. The balance 50% amount of compensation will be disbursed to 03 nos. of PAFs subject to dismantling of their home shed.</p> <p>As such, out of 84 nos. of PAFs, 79 have received full compensation, 03 have received 50 % compensation while 02 have not received 1st stage payment of the compensation.</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Compensation was also disbursed for: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> a. iii	Biodiversity Conservation Plan: the proposed Orchidarium near the barrage should include a provision for conservation of rare orchids that are likely to get submerged. Conservation of rare orchids as proposed should be carried out in consultation with the Department of Forest, Govt. of West Bengal and North Bengal University.	An Orchidarium and Arboretum has been established through Darjeeling Forest Division over an area of 06 ha forest land at Reang Block near TLD-IIIPS. Wild orchids were collected from the surrounding areas and transferred into Orchidarium for conservation in consultation with the Forest Deptt. and North Bengal University. An amount of Rs. 58.45 was deposited on behalf of both TLD-III & IV to West Bengal Forest Department. Out of which Rs. 30 lakh was utilized by Darjeeling Forest Division till date. Project is continuously pursuing with the State Forest Department for early completion of the balance works.

Medical facilities as well as recreational	Project was commissioned in 2013, as such no labour camp is present at project site. Free medical facilities are being provided to local villagers as well as others in the project dispensary.

The project was commissioned in 2013, as such no labour population residing at the project site now. Necessary health care facilities were provided by the Project as well as major contractors to the labour and staff engaged at work site during construction phase. Free medical facilities are also being provided to local villagers as well as laborers in the project dispensary run by the NHPC. Free medical check-ups camps, vaccination camp and awareness camps are being organized by the project on regular basis for providing easy and accessible medical facility to the people residing in and around the project area. Free medicines are made available from OPD to all needy ones from nearby villages. Dispensary runs the OPD & Emergency Services with 4 Beds for day care of patients. Fully equipped Ambulance services are available 24x7 for the patients. Dispensary is also equipped with modern facilities for checking health of mother and child in antenatal cases (pregnant women). OPD is regularly conducted in Deorali, a model village of TLD III PS with free medicines. Also, Project has provided medical equipment & Ambulance to the local Govt. PHC at Rambhi for improvement of overall health conditions of the local communities.

Muck generated during excavation and construction of project was dumped at designated dumping area.
